Corporate Information

Name of Company: St. Vincent and the Grenadines Port Authority

The St. Vincent and the Grenadines Port Authority (SVGPA) is responsible for the operation and administration of the Kingstown Deep Water Harbour, the nearby Campden Park Container Port (CPCP) and the Kingstown Cruise and Ferry Terminals.

Port Kingstown first began operations in September 1964 and is located in the capital city, Kingstown. The main quay is 900ft with additional 121ft of catwalk with a water dept alongside of 30ft. The Port handles both containerized and general cargo. The port also facilitates inter-island ferries and cruise ship services.

Campden Park Container Port is located just outside capital Kingstown, constructed in March 1993 at the Campden Park Industrial Estate. The Port is operated by the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Port Authority to Specifically handle containers.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of St. Vincent and the Grenadines Port Authority ("the Authority"), set out on pages 4 to 38, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2017, the statements of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, changes in equity and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, comprising significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Authority as at December 31, 2017, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Authority in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements in accordance with IFRS, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Authority's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

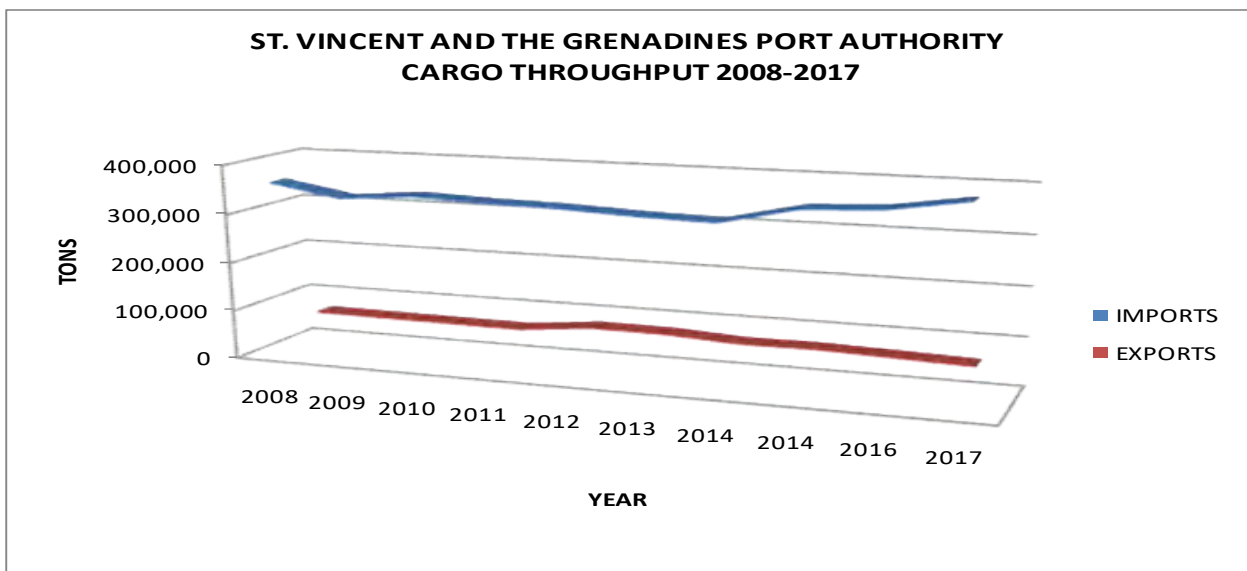


Total cargo throughput in 2017 amounted to four hundred and fifty three thousand, one hundred and thirty eight (453,138) tons. Imports registered three hundred and ninety-five thousands five hundred and forty-three (395,543) tons, while fifty-seven thousand five hundred and ninety-five (57,595) tons were exported.

In comparison to 2016 there was an overall increase in total cargo flow of 4.3%. The figures also revealed a 6.2% increase in imports and a 7.2% decrease in exports. Total cargo flow for 2016 amounting to Four Hundred and four-hundred and thirty four thousand five hundred and twenty-three thousands (434,523) tons.

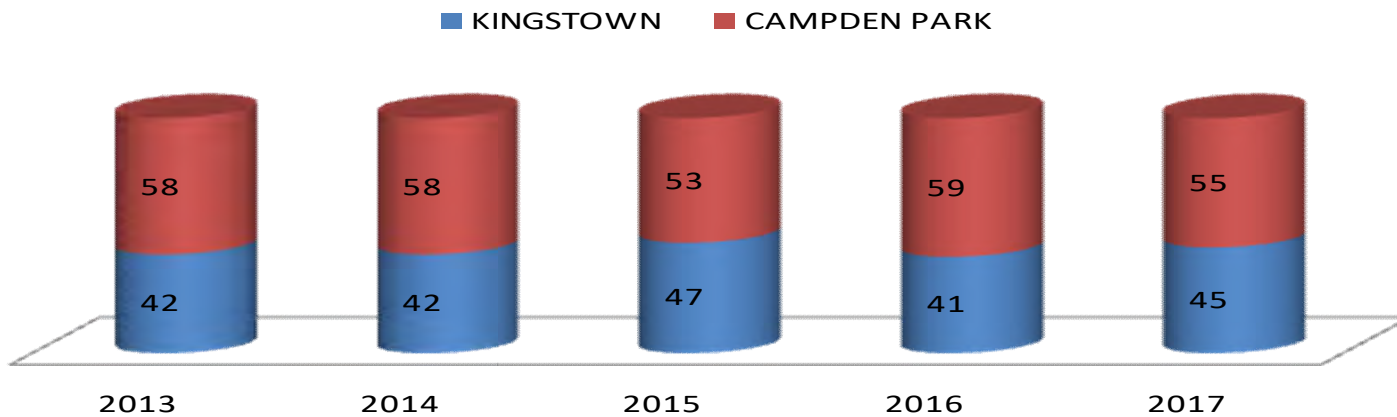

% SHARE OF TOTAL CARGO FLOW**



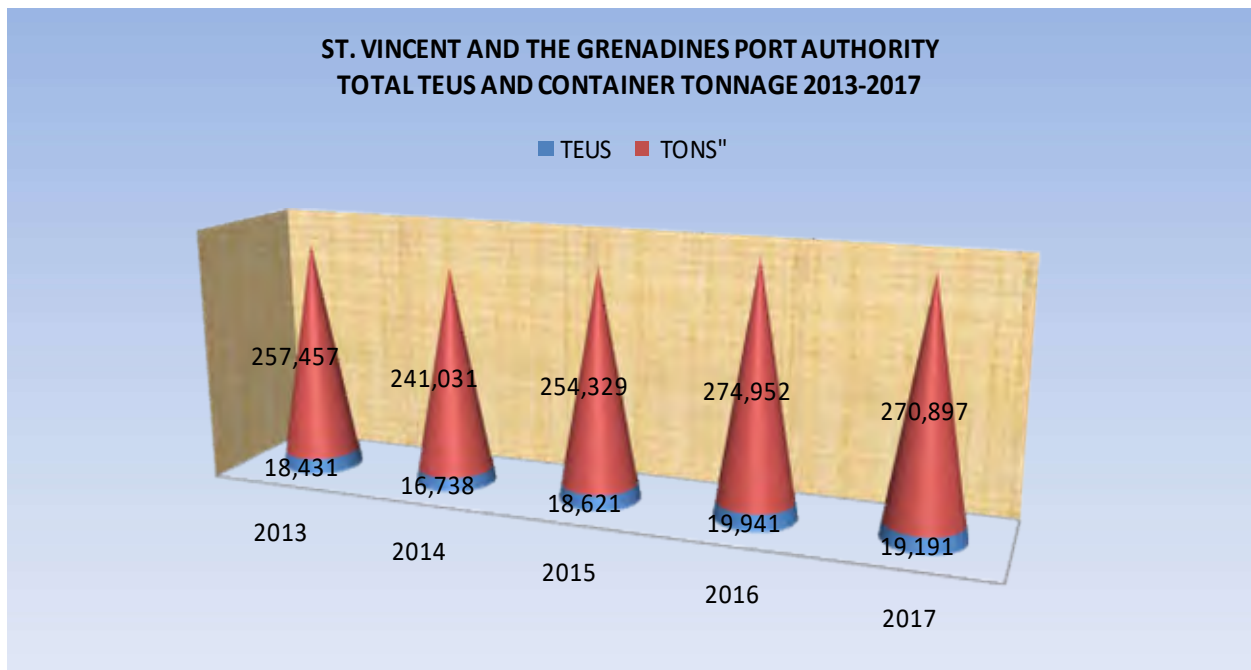

The year 2017 saw a decline in both container tonnage and teus. Container tonnage amounted to two hundred and seventy thousand, eight hundred and ninety-seven (270,897) tons while teus registered nineteen thousand, nine hundred and forty-one (19,941) teus.

The decline in teus was due to a decline in container export activities with only nine thousand three hundred and fifty-seven (9,357) teus being exported in 2017 as compared to ten thousand and fifty-four (10,054) teus in 2016, recoding a decline of 697 teus or 6.9%.

The decline of TEUS had a direct impact on container tonnage which experienced a slight decrease of (1.47) over 2016.

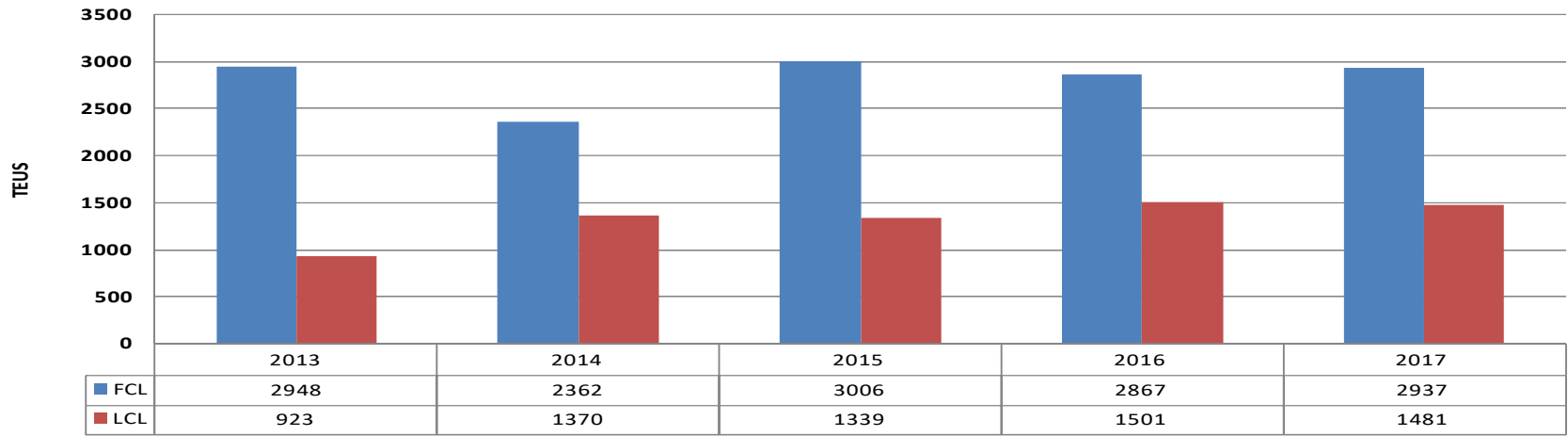

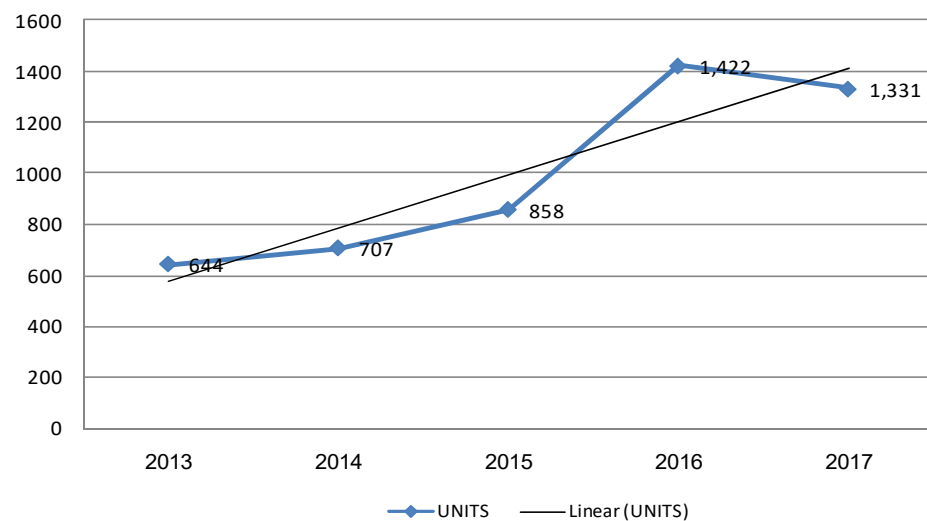

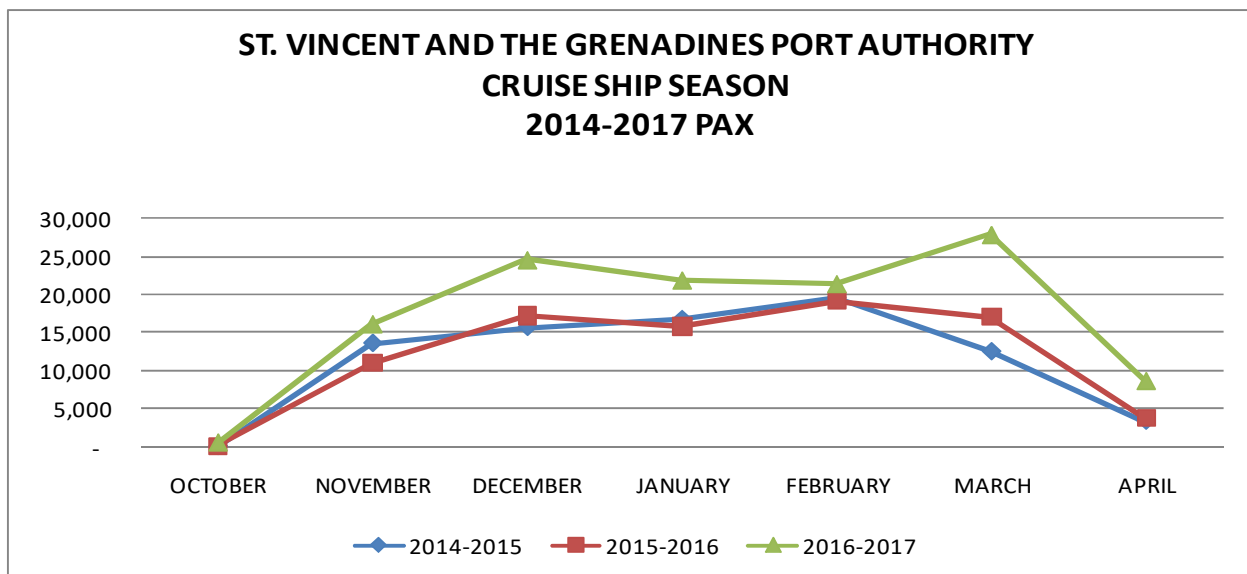

Cruise Ship Season in St. Vincent and the Grenadines runs from the month of October to the month of April; The multi-island chain welcomed one hundred and twenty –one thousand, seven hundred and sixty (121,1760) passengers and two hundred and eighteen (218) calls for the 2016-2017 season. Passengers entered from four ports of entry, being Kingstown on the mainland of St. Vincent and from Beqian, Union and Canouan in the Grenadines.

In comparison to the 2015-2016 cruise season there was an increase of passengers by 43.7% and decline in calls by (1.8)%. This huge increase in passengers was due to an increase in calls from high capacity ships such as Britannia at Port Kingstown and Marella in Port Bequia.

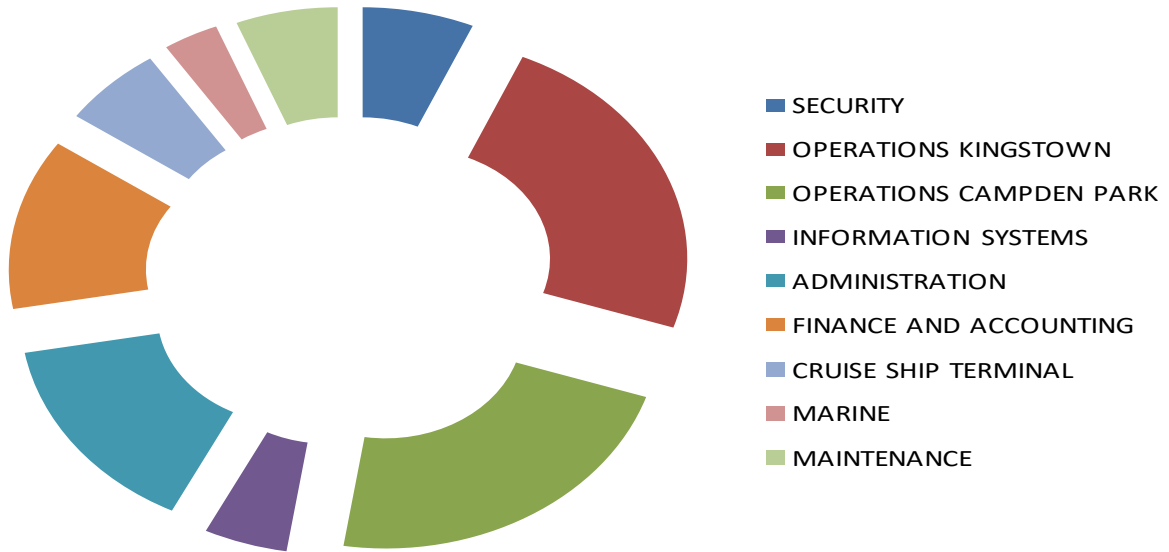
